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It's life Jim but not as we know it*......

Unfortunately the caption can be related to much of life at the current time, and more so at Yuletide. Amongst the many differences that will occur this year in households the length and breadth of the country are the inevitable changes to a wider field of festivities.

One that is disappointing from a purely local perspective is that for only the second time since it's inception, Lincoln Christmas Market has this year been cancelled. 10 years ago, the only other cancellation was when the weather was less than supportive.

In the early 1980s a small party of Lincoln City Councillors lead by the then leader Jim Sullivan travelled from Lincoln to the twin town of Neustadt an der Weinstrasse (literally new town on the wine route) in the German state of Rhineland-Palatinate to see the Christmas Market there. (nice work if you can get it). Christmas markets being a long established tradition in villages, large and small. Their visit and the impression it made was enough to encourage them on returning home to seek to establish a similar market in Lincoln. The result was the first German Christmas market in the UK with around a dozen stalls to what has now become one of the biggest in Europe.

The location at the top of Steep Hill, nestled between the Cathedral and the Castle are an almost fairytale setting and probably not bettered anywhere else here or in the fatherland. From humble beginnings in the first year when the strange concept must have drawn the usual criticisms of a council wasting public money, the event is a major tourist draw to the city. Estimates of visitor numbers range from 200,000 to approaching 300,000, a reasonable figure for a four day event that costs nothing at all to wander around.

The draw of the market is countrywide with many coach trips from all parts of the UK which has brought into use the County Showground as a bus and car park. Other visitors are from special railway trains that are again from various parts of the country that bring a variety of rolling stock some hauled by steam locomotives. Other locations have copied the idea and stage their own version of a market, but Lincoln is the father of them all, with stallholders from Germany using the convenience of the ferry link from Rotterdam to Hull. The range of Germanic products such Gluwein, Stollen, Bratwurst and Lebkuchen that were new in the early days are now available in supermarkets such as Lidl, Aldi and used to be in as well Netto before it disappeared.

German Christmas markets in Germany tend to last a lot longer than Lincoln's four days and as a result are quieter and easier to navigate. They also tend to go in for a green approach, green as in using a lot of conifer and ivy to trim practically everything from the stalls to bollards and traffic signs. A marked difference is that any Christmas lights also tend to be white, with no added colours. A lot of stalls sell traditional Christmas gifts made of wood and other hand made craft items. The market tradition is very old and several towns vie to claim to be the oldest, my favourite is one that in 1384 was granted the right to hold a market at Christmas by no other than one King Wenceslas.

Let's hope that we all enjoy a safe and joyous and merry Christmas this year however it is celebrated by us all.

Is this coming to Beckingham. At the moment no but with the current Covid damaged public finances it might just happen. To certain extent it already does happen in part since Beckingham Parish Council uses some of its precept for road maintenance and grass cutting.
